What is Pain?

“Pain is a more terrible lord of mankind than even death itself...”

Albert Schweitzer



APF Shingles/PHN Survey

- 74% of respondents did not know where to get information about pain management when they were diagnosed



APF Opioid Attitude Survey

- Most were under care of physician for pain management
- 51% felt they had little or no control over their pain
- Typical patient taking opioids still experienced breakthrough pain or severe flares ~2x a day



APF Opioid Attitude Survey

- Less than half “strongly agreed” that opioids are safe to take
- 38% “strongly agreed” that it is hard to consistently control pain with opioids



APF Opioid Attitude Survey

- Only 31% believed opioids are “very safe”
- 14% believed that opioids are dangerous



APF Opioid Attitude Survey

- Taking opioids is perceived as stigma
- Many patients are not getting enough information to manage their pain



APF Online Support Survey

- 60% of respondents are disabled because of their pain
- 76% used opioids as primary method of pain management
- Majority reported that severe pain continued to erode quality of life



Substance Abuse Issues

- Three groups to be aware of
- Appropriate use of language: addiction is not tolerance is not dependence
- Understand differences and similarities between chronic pain patient and substance abuser
- Patient's rights AND responsibilities



Address Behavior

- Management Principles
 - Know laws and regulations
 - Structure therapy to match perceived risk
- Proactive Strategies
 - Communicate goals of treatment
 - Provide written guidelines/treatment contract
 - Assess frequently
 - Avoid stigmatizing labels



Addressing Behavior

- Reactive Strategies
 - Collaborate with addiction-medicine community (addiction medicine specialist, substance abuse program, social worker, psychotherapist)

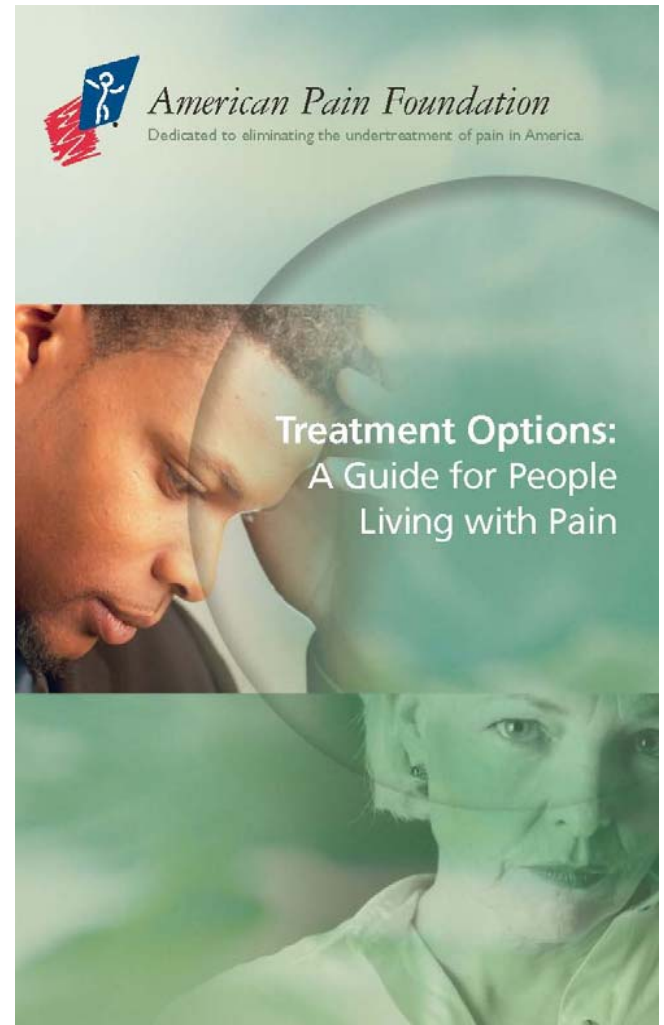
